SUBJECT: Extend Declaration of Local Emergency Due to COVID-19

RECOMMENDATION:

That City Council:

1. Review the need to continue the local emergency regarding the COVID-19 virus, find that the continuation until the next City Council meeting is necessary and appropriate, and ratify the continuation of the local emergency proclamation for the period between the March 23, 2020, City Council meeting and the April 13, 2020, City Council meeting, waiving the municipal code requirement (YMC 8.36.160) to review the local emergency every fourteen (14) days for the remainder of this emergency; and
2. Ratify the allocation of General Fund Contingency funds in the amount of \$27,500 utilized to fund the Chamber of Commerce's request for the City to accelerate the disbursement of the FY 2020/21 payment; *and*
3. *Ratify the City of Yucaipa Executive Order No. 20-01 regarding emergency recreational vehicle parking regulations, approved and issued by the Director of Disaster Services on April 10, 2020.*

BACKGROUND:

Governments worldwide are responding to an outbreak of respiratory disease caused by a novel (new) coronavirus that was first detected in China and which has now been detected in almost over 100 countries, including in the United States. The virus has been named "SARS-CoV-2" and the disease it causes has been named "Coronavirus Disease 2019" (abbreviated "COVID-19").

COVID-19 is a disease that has killed over 81,865 people worldwide, with over 398,185 confirmed cases in the United States. On, March 10, 2020, the San Bernardino County Department of Public Health proclaimed a Public Health Emergency and the Board of Supervisors issued a Proclamation of Local Emergency due to COVID-19. On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared the categorized disease as a global pandemic.

On Monday, March 16, 2020, the City Council held an Emergency Meeting to receive a status report regarding the COVID-19 Pandemic and directed staff to close the Scherer Community Center.

On Wednesday, March 18, 2020, the City Council held a second Emergency Meeting to adopted Resolution No. 2020-16, declaring a local emergency regarding the COVID-19 through April 6, 2020, and approved the closure of the Community Center, Performing Arts Center, as well as cancelling all park rentals, and modifying public access to City Hall until further notice.

On Monday, March 23, 2020, during regular session, City Council further approved closing fire stations and playgrounds/playground equipment at City parks until further notice, approved the Telecommuting Under the Pandemic Flu Policy for City employees, approved personnel policy revisions allowing sick time use consistent with the Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA), and approved the staggering of shifts for City employees, until further notice. City Council also approved extending the Emergency Declaration until Monday, April 13, 2020.

Pursuant to Yucaipa Municipal Code 8.36.160 and Section 8630 of the California Government Code, City Council shall review, at least every fourteen (14) days, until such local emergency is terminated, the need for continuing the local emergency. However, with the State Emergency Declaration being extended in thirty (30) day increments, and given that the time between City Council meetings at times exceeds 14 days, staff is recommending that City Council waive the 14-day extension requirement for the remainder of the emergency. Such declaration facilitates the City's response to combat perilous conditions by providing limited immunity for emergency actions of public employees and governing bodies, authorizing the issuance of orders and regulations to protect life and property, and activating pre-established local emergency provisions such as special purchasing and contracting procedures.

In addition, the San Bernardino County Department of Public Health recently updated their orders to include the requirement to wear masks any time residents are outside their home, including essential workers, which includes City staff working at City Hall. The recent order also included closing all park parking lots in the County and conveying certain citation/arrest authority to local police departments/contract Sheriff's Department stations in the County of San Bernardino. Finally, the City has collaborated with local medical professionals, the County of San Bernardino, Crafton Hills College, and the San Bernardino County Department of Public Health in hosting a mobile testing site for the community.

An Economic Recovery Committee has been established through the SBCTA City Managers Technical Advisory Committee, made up of San Bernardino County Executive Staff members and a subcommittee of City Managers throughout the County. The purpose of the Committee is to begin planning for reopening the economy here in San Bernardino County at the appropriate time.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The extension of this declaration of local emergency will maintain the City's compliance with State and Federal requirements for emergency response and promote the City's eligibility to receive State and Federal emergency assistance funds. The allocation of \$27,500 from the FY 2019/20 General Fund Contingency Account, pursuant to City Council direction to provide the FY 2020/21 payment to the Chamber of Commerce early due to the impacts of COVID-19, will leave a remaining balance of \$17,170 in that account.

Executive Order N-45-20

WHEREAS on March 4, 2020, I proclaimed a State of Emergency in California as a result of the threat of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS on March 17, 2020, I signed SB 117 (Chapter 3, Statutes of 2020), which ensures continuity of funding for state-subsidized child care providers impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic and authorizes the State Superintendent of Public Instruction to develop informal directives and bulletins to address contractual, attendance, and reporting requirements applicable to these providers for the 2019-20 fiscal year; and

WHEREAS child care is essential for working families, and in particular, for low-income and other parents who are considered essential critical infrastructure workers during this emergency, including health care workers; emergency response personnel; key governmental staff; law enforcement; food and agriculture workers, including grocery workers; and education and care providers; and

WHEREAS the COVID-19 emergency has created an increased need for child care for families who may not have previously needed child care, or who may now require additional hours of child care; and

WHEREAS the federal government has provided additional flexibility to the states for the use of funding provided by the Child Care and Development Fund; and

WHEREAS there is a temporary need for administrative flexibility for child care programs, to reduce barriers to care while ensuring the health and well-being of children, families, and providers; and

WHEREAS the federal government has provided flexibility to the data-sharing allowances for State educational agencies and school food authorities administering school lunch programs under the Richard B. Russell National School Lunch Act to release information necessary to administer the Pandemic Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP); and

WHEREAS the COVID-19 pandemic and related physical distancing requirements have impacted governmental agencies' ability to adhere to certain statutory deadlines; and

WHEREAS under the provisions of Government Code section 8571, I find that strict compliance with various statutes and regulations specified in this order would prevent, hinder, or delay appropriate actions to prevent and mitigate the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GAVIN NEWSOM, Governor of the State of California, in accordance with the authority vested in me by the State Constitution and statutes of the State of California, and in particular, Government Code sections 8567 and 8571, do hereby issue the following Order to become effective immediately:

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT:

1. In order to facilitate the continued provision of child care during the COVID-19 outbreak, any provision in Articles 1 through 11, 12, 15.5 through 18, 20, and 21 of Chapter 2 of Part 6 of Division 1 of the Education Code and implementing regulations in Chapter 19 and 19.5 of Division 1 of Title 5, California Code of Regulations, that restricts a child care and development program impacted by COVID-19 from serving children of essential critical infrastructure workers, defined consistent with Executive Order N-33-20 and as described in the document posted at <https://covid19.ca.gov/img/EssentialCriticalInfrastructureWorkers.pdf>, is suspended for a period of 60 days, provided that services are provided consistent with an informal directive or bulletin issued by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction pursuant to SB 117 (Chapter 3, Statutes of 2020) and that costs associated with all services provided pursuant to the informal directive or bulletin are within the budget authority of the California Department of Education.
2. In order to ensure that essential critical infrastructure workers can obtain necessary child care to continue working to assist the State's response to COVID-19, the eligibility requirements in Education Code section 8263(a) and any accompanying regulations and the enrollment priorities in Education Code section 8263(b)(2) and (3) are waived with respect to non-CalWORKS early learning and care services provided to children of essential critical infrastructure workers, defined consistent with Executive Order N-33-20 and as described in the document posted at <https://covid19.ca.gov/img/EssentialCriticalInfrastructureWorkers.pdf>.
3. The California Department of Education and the California Department of Social Services shall, by April 7, 2020, jointly develop and issue guidance on prioritizing enrollment for children of essential critical infrastructure workers, as authorized by Paragraph 2. This guidance shall include, but need not be limited to, provisions intended to ensure that neglected or abused children who are recipients of child protective services, or children who are at risk of being neglected or abused, retain first priority for services as specified in Education Code section 8263(b)(1).
4. The California Department of Education and the California Department of Social Services shall, by April 7, 2020, jointly develop and issue guidance on group size, physical distancing, food safety, and other healthy practices in child care settings that reflects the best practices contained in current guidance from federal, state, and local public health officials related to COVID-19.

5. The requirements in Education Code section 8273 and any accompanying regulations or other written policies or procedures related to assessment of fees for families using preschool and child care and development services pursuant to Chapter 2 of Part 6 of Division 1 of the Education Code are suspended for a period of 60 days.
6. Any provision in Article 22.5 of Chapter 2 of Part 6 of Division 1 of the Education Code and any accompanying regulations related to the After School Education and Safety Program that restricts a program funded pursuant to that Article from operating during the hours that school is ordinarily in session while a school is closed to address COVID-19 or from serving school-age children of essential critical infrastructure workers, defined consistent with Executive Order N-33-20 and as described in the document posted at <https://covid19.ca.gov/img/EssentialCriticalInfrastructureWorkers.pdf>, is suspended for a period of 60 days. The California Department of Education may waive any of the reporting, auditing, or other requirements specified in Education Code section 8482.3(f) for the period covered by this suspension.
7. To the extent that any provision in Article 22.6 of Chapter 2 of Part 6 of Division 1 of the Education Code and any accompanying regulations related to 21st Century Community Learning Centers grant includes requirements beyond the requirements imposed by federal statutes or regulations, those requirements are suspended for a period of 60 days.
8. The calculations applicable to calendar year 2019 required by Education Code sections 8483.7(a)(1)(C) and 8483.7(a)(1)(D) for recipients of the After School Education and Safety grant are suspended.
9. The calculations applicable to calendar year 2019 required by Education Code section 8426(d)(2) and (3) for recipients of the 21st Century High School After School and Enrichment for Teens (ASSETs) are suspended, to the extent such suspension is consistent with applicable federal statutes and regulations (including, but not limited to, any applicable federal statutes or regulations with which compliance is required as a condition for the receipt of federal funds).
10. In order to allow California to take advantage of flexibility provided under Public Law 116-127 to provide Pandemic SNAP benefits to children, Education Code sections 49076, 49558 and 49557.3 and any accompanying regulations are waived for the limited purpose of authorizing the sharing of data between the California Department of Social Services and the California Department of Education to identify students who may be eligible for the Pandemic SNAP benefit.
11. The California Department of Social Services may, for the next 60 days and in consultation with the California Department of Education, waive any of the licensing, contractual, and payment requirements specified in Education Code section 8351 and any accompanying regulations, or other written policies or procedures related to CalWORKs Stage One Child Care; in Welfare and Institutions Code


section 11461.6 and any accompanying regulations, or other written policies or procedures related to the Emergency Child Care Bridge for Foster Children; and in Chapter 3.35 of Division 2 of the Health and Safety Code and any accompanying regulations, or other written policies or procedures related to Child Care Provider Registration.

12. The deadline specified in Water Code section 85200(d) for an appointing authority to fill a vacancy on the Delta Stewardship Council is extended for a period of 60 days.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that as soon as hereafter possible, this Order be filed in the Office of the Secretary of State and that widespread publicity and notice be given of this Order.

This Order is not intended to, and does not, create any rights or benefits, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity, against the State of California, its agencies, departments, entities, officers, employees, or any other person.

Public Health officer orders face covering, electronic-only religious services



In an effort to protect the public from further spread of COVID-19, the County's Acting Health Officer has formally ordered everyone in San Bernardino County to wear a face covering when leaving home.

Face coverings may include coverings that secure to the ears or back of the head and encompass the mouth and nose. Homemade cloth ear loop covers, bandannas and handkerchiefs, and neck gaiters may be used to reduce the spread of COVID-19 particularly among asymptomatic people. Surgical masks and N95 masks must be preserved for healthcare workers and emergency responders.

"Staying home, practicing social distancing and frequent handwashing are far more effective ways to combat the spread of COVID-19, and face coverings are not a substitute for those practices," said Dr. Erin Gustafson, the County's Acting Public Health Officer.

Tuesday's order also says faith-based services must be electronic only through streaming or online technology. People may not leave their homes for driving parades or drive-up services or to pick up non-essential items such as pre-packaged Easter eggs or bags filled with candy and toys at a drive-thru location.

"We understand that this is an important time for Christians around the world and it is natural to want to worship and celebrate with our families. Right now, however, is a critical time for our country and our community – we can still celebrate this time from the safety of our individual homes while we help flatten the curve and save lives," said Board of Supervisors Chairman Curt Hagman. "When we stay home we help our healthcare workers and our emergency responders and vulnerable populations beat COVID-19."

Many churches and houses of worship are hosting "virtual" services, streamed online. The County encourages single-family, home-based worshipping and activities, including Easter egg hunts among household members inside the house or in residential back yards.

As of today, San Bernardino County has 530 confirmed cases of COVID-19 and the deaths of 16 county residents have been associated with the disease.

ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE COUNTY OF SAN BERNARDINO

FOR THE CONTROL OF COVID-19

DATE OF ORDER: April 7, 2020

Please read this Order carefully. Violation of or failure to comply with this Order is a crime punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both. (California Health and Safety Code § 120295; County Code Section 31.0101 Et. Seq.)

UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE SECTIONS 101040, 101085, AND 120175, TITLE 17 CALIFORNIA CODE OF REGULATIONS SECTION 2501, AND SAN BERNARDINO COUNTY CODE SECTION 31.0101 ET. SEQ., THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE COUNTY OF SAN BERNARDINO ("HEALTH OFFICER") ORDERS:

Effective 12:00 a.m. on Wednesday, April 8, 2020, and continuing until rescinded, pending further Order of the Public Health Officer, the following will be in effect for the County of San Bernardino (hereinafter the "County"):

1. The Orders of the San Bernardino County Health Officer issued on March 17, 2020 and March 27, 2020, Governor Newsom's Executive Order N-22-20 and order of the California State Public Health Officer issued on March 19, 2020, requiring all persons residing in the State to remain in their homes or places of residence, except as needed to maintain the continuity of operations for critical infrastructure (the "Stay-at-Home Order") remain in effect until the Governor's Executive Order N-22-20, and the Orders of the San Bernardino County Health Officer remain in effect until they are rescinded.
2. Under the Orders of the San Bernardino County Health Officer, the California State Public Health Officer, and Governor Newsom's Executive Order N-22-20, all individuals living in the State of California are ordered to stay home or at their place of residence except as need to maintain continuity of operations of the federal critical infrastructure sectors, as outlined at <https://covid19.ca.gov/img/EssentialCriticalInfrastructureWorkers.pdf>. This guidance does allow faith based services that are provided through streaming or other technology, while individuals remain in their homes, but does not allow individuals to leave their homes for driving parades or drive-up services, or for picking-up non-essential items.

3. All non-essential businesses that do not fall under the Essential Critical Infrastructure referenced above are ordered to remain closed. All essential businesses that remain in operation in accordance with the above referenced Orders of the San Bernardino County Health Officer, the Order of the California State Public Health Officer, and Governor Newsom's Executive Order N-22-20, shall follow the Social Distancing and Infection Control Guidelines published by the CDC and California Department of Public Health. All essential businesses must ensure all required measures are implemented and must identify and require measures necessary to implement social distancing and sanitation at that particular facility. If the measures identified and implemented are not effective in maintaining proper social distancing and sanitation, additional measures shall be identified and implemented or the facility shall be closed.
4. All persons, including Essential Workers shall wear face coverings, such as scarves (dense fabric, without holes), bandanas, neck gaiters, or other fabric face coverings, when they leave their homes or places of residence for essential activities. All persons, including non-medical Essential Workers are discouraged from using Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), such as N95 masks, for non-medical reasons. Staff working at facilities listed in Attachment A at <http://wp.sbcounty.gov/dph/wp-content/uploads/sites/7/2020/04/Attachment-A-and-B.pdf> must follow the Order of the San Bernardino County Public Health Officer issued on April 6, 2020, requiring staff at these facilities to wear a surgical mask at all times while in the facility.
5. All essential businesses shall make every effort to use telecommuting for its workforce.
6. Government entities shall enforce social distancing requirements at all parks and trails. If a government entity is unable to enforce social distancing at a park or trail, it shall be closed to the public. Parking lots at all parks and/or trails shall be closed and shall be accessible only by members of the public within walking distance of the parks and/or trails. Said parks and/or trails shall be used solely for walking, hiking, equestrian or bicycle riding. The public shall not congregate or participate in group sporting activities at such parks and/or trails.
7. A strong recommendation is made that all persons who are 65 years old or older, have a chronic underlying condition, or have a compromised immune system self-quarantine themselves at home.
8. Hospitals and healthcare providers shall take measures to preserve and prioritize resources including delaying non-emergent or elective surgeries or procedures where feasible.
9. All persons arriving in the county from international locations identified on the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Warning Level 2 or 3 Travel Advisory (available at: <https://www.cdc.gov/travel/notifications>) shall be subject to 14-day home quarantine, self-monitoring.
10. A strong recommendation is made for persons exhibiting mild to moderate symptoms of COVID-19 to self-isolate in their place of residence unless seeking medical treatment. A guide to symptoms is found here: <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/symptoms-testing/symptoms.html>.
11. This Order is issued based on evidence of increasing transmission of COVID-19 within the County, in the state of California, and worldwide, scientific evidence regarding the most effective approach to slow transmission of communicable diseases generally and COVID-19 specifically, as well as

best practices as currently known and available to protect the public from the risk of spread of or exposure to COVID-19. The virus that causes COVID-19 (known as SARS-CoV2) has infected over one million individuals worldwide in over 180 countries and is implicated in over 76,000 worldwide deaths, including at least 530 cases and 16 deaths in San Bernardino County. These numbers increase significantly every day.

12. This Order is intended to reduce the likelihood of exposure to COVID-19, thereby slowing the spread of COVID-19 in communities worldwide. This Order will help to reduce the number of Californians who contract COVID-19 before an effective treatment or vaccine is available; protect those most likely to experience severe symptoms, such as older Californians and those with underlying chronic conditions; preserve and protect our healthcare delivery system; and minimize the social and economic impacts of COVID-19 over the long run.
13. This Order is issued in accordance with, and incorporates by reference, the: March 4, 2020 Proclamation of a State Emergency issued by Governor Gavin Newsom; the March 10, 2020 Declaration of Local Health Emergency based on an imminent and proximate threat to public health from the introduction of novel COVID-19 in San Bernardino County; the March 10, 2020 Resolution of the Board of Supervisors of the County of San Bernardino proclaiming the existence of a Local Emergency in the County of San Bernardino regarding COVID-19; the March 10, 2020 Resolution of the Board of Supervisors of the County of San Bernardino ratifying and extending the Declaration of Local Health Emergency due to COVID-19; and Executive Order N-22-20 of the Governor of California and Order of the State Public Health Officer issued on March 19, 2020.
14. This Order comes after the release of substantial guidance from the Health Officer, the California Department of Public Health, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and other public health officials throughout the United States and around the world, including but not limited to, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's "Interim Additional Guidance for Infection Prevention and Control for Patients with Suspected or Confirmed COVID-19 in Nursing Homes", the California Department of Public Health Face Covering Guidance issued on April 1, 2020, and Recommendation Regarding the Use of Cloth Face Coverings from the Centers from Disease Control and Prevention issued on April 3, 2020.
15. This Order is made in accordance with all applicable State and Federal laws, including but not limited to: Health and Safety Code sections 101030, et seq.; Health and Safety Code sections 120100, et seq.; and Title 17 of the California Code of Regulations section 2501.
16. This Order shall not supersede any conflicting or more restrictive orders issued by the State of California or Federal governments, including any requirements regarding child care. If any portion of this Order or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held to be invalid the remainder of the Order, including the application of such part or provision to other persons or circumstances, shall not be affected and shall continue in full force and effect. To this end, the provisions of this Order are severable.
17. To the extent necessary, pursuant to Government Code sections 26602 and 41601 and Health and Safety Code section 101029, this order is enforceable by the Sheriff and all Chiefs of Police in the County. The violation of any provision of this Order constitutes an imminent threat to public health.



The City of Yucaipa and the San Bernardino County Department of Public Health are hosting a COVID-19 Specimen Point of Collection for Yucaipa residents, Saturday, April 11, 10AM – 1PM at Crafton Hills College. No appointments are needed, all criteria must be met, and clients must remain in their vehicles.


To qualify, you must meet the three testing criteria:

- 1. Fever**
- 2. Shortness of breath**
- 3. Cough**

Residents who are experiencing these symptoms and believe they qualify for the specimen test should proceed to the collection area with their windows rolled up. The entrance to the collection area can only be accessed via westbound Yucaipa Blvd to northbound Sand Canyon. Vehicles attempting to enter via any other means will be turned away. Residents will be screened by San Bernardino County Department of Public Health officials prior to the collection. The drive-up only collection point will be open while supplies last. If you do not meet the specific criteria, you will not be tested and will be asked to exit the collection area. Thank you for your understanding.

Clarification of religious services and face-coverings order



The need has arisen for clarification of a Public Health Order and subsequent guidance issued Tuesday regarding religious services and face coverings.

The County acknowledges the manner in which the order and guidance were created and disseminated created unintended consequences and hardships. The County has taken steps to ensure appropriate notice and coordination will occur in the future as we address the complicated and fast-moving crisis faced by our community and the entire world.

"We recognize the need to act quickly to slow the spread of COVID-19 throughout San Bernardino County," said Board of Supervisors Chairman Curt Hagman. "But we also recognize that we must take into consideration the myriad of impacts that can be felt in a large and diverse county, and be willing to provide clarification and make adjustments while keeping our communities safe and healthy."

The specific references to drive-in religious services so close to major religious observances taking place during the next four days, for which organizations had already conducted considerable planning and incurred expenses, are clarified as follows: Organizations that have planned such services for the coming weekend should proceed with those services if they choose to do so and make every effort to prevent contact between congregants.

Regarding the use of face-coverings while driving, there is no need for drivers traveling alone or with members of their households to wear face coverings unless they must lower their windows to interact with first responders, food service workers, or others who are not members of their households.

Other clarifying guidance will be forthcoming.

On the subject of enforcement, the public is advised that although violation of a health order is a violation of the California Health and Safety Code, the County does not expect law enforcement to broadly impose citations on violators. The expectation is that law enforcement will rely upon community members to use good judgment, common sense, and act in the best interests of their own health and the health of their loved ones and the community at large. The imposition of penalties on members of the public who willfully and grossly disregard public health orders by putting others at risk of exposure to this infectious disease is meant as a tool for law enforcement to use as a deterrent.

San Bernardino County has 547 confirmed cases of COVID-19 and the deaths of 17 county residents have been associated with the disease.

Various appropriate County departments and agencies have been working together since Jan. 25 to protect the community from the COVID-19 pandemic.

CITY OF YUCAIPA EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 20-01

AN EXECUTIVE ORDER OF THE DIRECTOR OF DISASTER SERVICES OF THE CITY OF YUCAIPA REGARDING EMERGENCY RECREATIONAL VEHICLE PARKING REGULATIONS

I. Recitals.

A. International, national, state, and local health and governmental authorities are responding to an outbreak of respiratory disease caused by a novel coronavirus named “coronavirus disease 2019,” abbreviated COVID-19, (“COVID-19”); and

B. On March 4, 2020, the Governor of the State of California declared a state of emergency to make additional resources available, formalize emergency actions already underway across multiple state agencies and departments, and help the state prepare for broader spread of COVID-19; and

C. On March 13, 2020, the President of the United States of America declared a national emergency and announced that the federal government would make emergency funding available to assist state and local governments in preventing the spread of and addressing the effects of COVID-19; and

D. On March 17, 2020, the Health Officer of the County of San Bernardino adopted a new order that places a prohibition on certain types of public gatherings until 11:59 p.m. on April 6, 2020; and

E. On March 18, 2020, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2020-16 proclaiming the existence of a local emergency pursuant to Government Code Section 8630 to set forth applicable powers, functions and duties of the City’s Director of Disaster Services (the City Manager), and the City’s Disaster Council to ensure an effective response to the novel coronavirus (“COVID-19”); and

F. On March 19, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order N-33-20 to implement directives developed by the State Public Health Officer that require all individuals living in the State of California to stay at their place of residence except as needed to maintain continuity of operations of the federal critical infrastructure and other essential sectors; and,

G. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the California Department of Public Health, and the San Bernardino County Health Officer have all issued recommendations and/or orders including but not limited to social distancing, staying home if sick, canceling or postponing large group events, working from home, and other precautions to protect public health and prevent transmission of this communicable virus; and

H. During this local emergency, and in the interest of protecting the public health and preventing transmission of COVID-19, it is essential to provide various avenues to provide

accommodations for residents in need of isolation or quarantine in order to protect themselves and their families from transmission of COVID-19; and

I. In the interest of public peace, health, and safety, as affected by the emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19, it is necessary to modify regulations applicable to the placement of Recreational Vehicles on public streets and alleys and in certain driveway locations during the duration of the City's proclaimed COVID-19 emergency to further the protection of the public peace, health, and safety.

II. Order.

The Director of Disaster Services of the City of Yucaipa does order as follows:

SECTION 1. Suspension of Certain Restrictions on Recreational Vehicle Parking. Notwithstanding the provisions of Yucaipa Municipal Coded Sections 10.12.050(A) and 87.0510(i), and subject to the minimum requirements set forth in Section 2 below, Recreational Vehicles may be parked on City residential streets and alleys and on driveways in front and street-side yard setbacks for the purpose of providing additional accommodations for a) first responders and health professionals responding to the COVID-19 emergency, or b) residents and/or their family members who must isolate or be quarantined as a result of COVID-19. This order is not intended to allow storage of recreational vehicles on City streets and alleys and on driveways in front and street-side setbacks for reasons other than providing accommodations related to persons impacted by COVID-19.

SECTION 2. Minimum Health and Safety Standards for Recreational Vehicle on City Streets or Alleys or in Driveways within Front Yard Setbacks. Any Recreational Vehicle parked on any City street or alley or in a driveway area located in the front yard or street-side yard setback area shall comply with the following minimum standards:

A. The Recreational Vehicle shall be parked in a manner so as not to block or inhibit through traffic, pedestrian paths of travel including sidewalks, or to block any other person's access to their real property.

B. No electrical, water, or any other utility connection for the Recreational Vehicle shall be extended across any sidewalk or other pedestrian access.

C. Sewage disposal shall only occur at a duly authorized waste disposal site, and no sewage disposal or discharge shall occur in the public street, alley, or any other right-of-way, or on any private property, including the property on which the Recreational Vehicle may be placed.

D. The Recreational Vehicle shall be in good working order, and shall provide an adequate and safe heat source and sanitary facilities.

E. Long-term Recreational Vehicle hook ups may require a new 240 volt circuit and outdoor weather-resistant receptacle installation. In such instances, a Building Permit shall be required per the 2019 California Building Code as adopted by the City of Yucaipa. The City's Building and Safety staff shall use best efforts to fast track any permits requested, and

necessary inspections, to accommodate placement of any Recreational Vehicle(s) for use pursuant to Section 1 above.

SECTION 3. Violations.

This Order shall be punishable as set forth in Government Code Section 8665 and Chapter 1.12 of the Yucaipa Municipal Code.

SECTION 4. Term. This Order shall remain in effect for the period of local emergency declared in response to COVID-19 within the City.

SECTION 5. Effective Date. This Order is issued for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety and therefore shall be effective immediately upon its issuance.

SECTION 6. Severability. The Director of Disaster Services declares that, should any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Order for any reason be held invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Order. The Director of Disaster Services hereby declares that it would have adopted this Order and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions thereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 7. Publication. The City Clerk shall cause notice of this Order to be disseminated to the public and be given widespread publicity and notice.
